The awardees are:

Kenji Horigome: Downtown Magnet High School, Harvey Mudd College, Claremont, major: astrophysics Jacob Oei: Edison High School,

UC Berkeley; major: psychology Isabella Wada: South Pasadena High School, American University of Paris for first year, then transferring to USC; major: marketing

Awardees are of Japanese descent and from single-parent families. The scholarship is named in memory of Hana Uno Shepard, a chapter member who was active in the redress movement of the 1980s

Community Groups to Honor Sakura ICF Senior Relocatees on July 23

One year ago, approximately 90 residents, mostly Japanese and Japanese American women in their 80s and 90s, were evicted from Pacifica's Sakura Intermediate Care Facility to make way for apartments and a parking lot.

JA community organizations will bonor all relocatees and their families with presentations to those at Atherton Homes for their courage, perseverence and survival through the eviction and the trauma of relocation.

Of importance to all relocaters Save Our Seniors Network (SOSN) began direct talks with the Office of the California Attorney General, Rob Bonta, and specifically with Special Assistant Attorney General James Toma, in early 2022 and requested that office to address specific issues as outlined below.

SOSN thanks Attorney General Bonta and Special Assistant Attorney General Toma for working with Pacifica Companies to restore a level of culturally sensitive facility care to the displaced former Sakura ICF residents, allow all former Sakura ICF residents, allow all former Sakura ICF residents currently participating in the Assisted Living Warver (ALW) Program to remain at the Sakura Gardens Assisted Living and Memory Care Facility for their lifetimes, being charged no more than what Medical and SSI provides; and invite all other former Sakura ICF residents

to apply to the ALW Program to join familiar Sakura Gardens neighbors and former ICI: residents on the 325 Boyle Ave. campus

All relocatees will be entertained by Robie and Steve La on tarko and Japanese vocal performances by Ruma Chamberlain, Yoshie Sato and Nonko MacIntosh. All will be presented with beautiful handmade Lap blankets. Sakura Family Council member and SOSN member Kensaku Nakayama stated, "The period of relocation of the Sakura ICI residents during the summer of 2021 as the facility was shutting down was a time filled with uncertainty for all displaced residents. Seniors who had considered the Sakura ICF facility as home were forced to accept new, unfamiliar environments, often with no Japanese language staff and culturally sensitive activities, many suffering from transfer trainina

The July 23 event will be held to recognize the displaced seniors for their courage and perseverance.

Sign on to letter to DA Gascón in support of the Roque family regarding Nicholas Weber's July 11 arraignment



L.A. Tanabata Festival Restarts For 2022

The story of the Los Angeles Tanabata Festival has involved so many people and organizations volunteering their time, their creativity, and energy—yet it all started with one man over 13 years ago

Yoshihito Yonezawa was born in Sendar, the capital city of Miyaga Prefecture. He grew up experiencing the community and wonder shared by the largest Tanabata festival in the country. As an Issei in Los Angeles and active within the JA community, he dreamed of bringing the same joy and community spirit to Los Angeles.

The first Tanabata Festival can be traced back to 16th century Japan, at the start of the Edo Period It is a celebration held on the seventh day of the seventh month and brings the legend of the Princess and the Cowherder to vibrant possibilities and colorful life in the form of seven decorations

Tanzaku 知酬 (paper strips of bandwritten wishes)

Orizuru 折り間 (paper cranes to symbolize long and healthy lives)

Kinchaku III (purses to symbolize wealth and good business)

Toami 投稿 (nets made of paper to catch not only large hauls of fish but also good fortune)

Kamigoromo 紙水 (paper kimono to display a wish for improved sewing and artistic skills)

Kuzukago (Vin C (ornamental paper trash bags to celebrate cleanliness and frugality)

And perhaps most famously, fiskinagashi % SML (long streamers of paper hanging down from a frame to symbolize the art of weaving) that are usually hung underneath a circular ball or box frame

The famed Sendai kazari (decorations) are now available for us to view during our festival that we set in August, to coincide with Nisei Week festivities thanks to the hard work and dedication of Mr. Yonezawa

Given the incredible work effort and diligence of many volunteers and painstaking meetings to discuss legal issues, city codes and renting spaces to be able to welcome the greater community into the cultural climate of Little Tokyo, the first-ever Los Angeles Tanabata Festival caused eyes to widen and jaws to drop in 2009.

Since then, more and more people

have enjoyed the various workshops that would teach people how to make decorations while humbly asking for donations to keep this group working. Workshops were held at various cherry blossom festivals and JA events and many organizations. We wholeheartedly enjoyed crafting a kazari to enter into the competition.

In 2019, LATF held a workshop at Anime Expo downtown and widehed its appeal to even more people. The festival that year hung kazari outside the MOCA for everyone to view, boasted food booths sponsored by kenjikai groups and community or ganizations and various other booths, and also held a competition for kazari in different categories.

But the pandemic brought the festivities to a screeching half and it's been a road of recovery for its committee, so 2022 will be seeing a new version of the Los Angeles Tanabata Festival that will focus even more on community and sharing those stones with the public


In partnership with the Japanese American National Museum, this year's kazari submissions will also be asked about why they are involved with this festival. Every decoration that graces the winds in Little Tokyo has a story to share and we are eager to document it from the people who make them and the organizations that sponsor them.

The LATF Committee is proud to announce the theme for this year's festival is "Tusion" and looks forward to organizing its free events to spread the hope and optimism we have been holding in reserve during these tough few years
