Lil Tokyo Reporter and A Rebel's Outcry

On October 9, 2022 in a GLA JACL virtual program, the 30-minute short film *Lil Tokyo Reporter* was shown. Directed by Jeffrey Gee Chin and with actor Chis Tashima as Sei Fujii, the film celebrates its 10th anniversary.

From the Little Tokyo Historical Society website where the DVD is available for purchase:

Lil Tokyo Reporter is a 30-minute narrative short set in 1930's Los Angeles and was developed Summer 2009 and completed in Fall 2012. The project was supported by donations from the Asian American community, grants, and volunteered talent. The film was inspired by the True Story of Civil Rights Leader Sei Fujii, a man who protected the livelihood of the Japanese American people from 1903-1954. Thus far the film team received JACL's Pacific Citizen Award for Extraordinary APAs in the Entertainment Field and \$38,000 in grants (California Civil Liberties Public Education Program, UCLA's Aratani & Terasaki Foundations, and Union Bank). The film is also a production of Visual Communications and the Little Tokyo Historical Society. The film has won over 16 awards in film festivals across the United States.

Miyako Kadogawa tells the climax of the film: The climax was the assassination attempt on Sei Fujii who started *Kashu Mainichi* and, through the newspaper, did criticize the Japanese gambling casino/bar which stole from players and demanded "protection money" from the merchants of Little Tokyo. The ending shows him being discharged/walking out of the Japanese Hospital which Sei Fujii worked many years, even having to go to the Supreme Court, to help it to be built by Japanese pioneers (buy the property in the first place).


Following the film, there was discussion of *Lil Tokyo Reporter* and introduction of the book *A Rebel's Outcry*. In the nearly 30 minutes discussion were Jeffrey Gee Chin, Chris Tashima and George Shaw shown in screen shots.

Jeffrey Gee Chin, director and publisher, was the director and scriptwriter of *Lil Tokyo Reporter*, his first film. In the years since, he has worked as director in other films. **Fumiko Carole Fujita**, executive producer of *Lil Tokyo Reporter*, had Zoomed into the program and was introduced. Fujita had researched the history of the Japanese Hospital and of Sei Fujii and felt the need of a film. She met Chin at a Japanese American National Museum function in San Francisco regarding a program on the Japanese Hospital and, as the saying goes, the rest is history. Chin and Fujita collaborated and eventually published the book *A Rebel's Outcry*.

Academy award winner **Chris Tashima** portrayed Sei Fujii in the film. Tashima encouraged support of artists and filmmakers and encouraged the telling stories of Japanese history and of people who made a difference. It is easier to tell stories in this time of digital filmmaking and streaming platforms. Tashima is an actor in the recently released movie *No No Girl*.

George Shaw, composer for film, TV and games, composed the music for *Lil Tokyo Reporter*. Shaw is Taiwanese American of Chinese and Japanese descent. He learned recently that his grandmother is Japanese. Shaw's recent work is composing the music for *Abominable and the Invisible City*, DreamWorks' animated TV series now streaming on Hulu and Peacock.

A Rebel's Outcry: Biography of Issei Civil Rights Leader Sei Fujii (1882-1954) is an illustrated biography and detailed look into the life of Japanese American civil rights leader Sei Fujii, known for overturning the California Alien Land Law in 1952 and founding the Japanese American newspaper Kashu Mainichi (California Daily News). His complex history reveals his intriguing journey as an immigrant, a social justice activist, unionizer, and a community leader. Fujii's story exemplifies the multitude of ways Americans have and may continue to fight for our civil rights.

The official biography on Sei Fujii is the source material written by author Kenichi Sato and was commissioned by manager Junko Maruya of the *Kashu Mainichi*. Following the work by Sato, LTHS conducted over ten years of extensive research, including interviews with countless community members, Fujii's family, and visiting his ancestral samurai home in the Takamori Village of Iwakuni, Japan. Publication of this book is sponsored by Union Bank and UCLA Asian American Studies Center and the George and Sakaye Aratani Community Advancement Research Endowment.
